Pirritu's (Brett Lee) music is gentle, honest and from the heart. He is Ngiyampaa man and First Nations singer-songwriter.

Heart Songs write and perform songs about people, present and passed, songs about the heart, for the heart and from the heart.

Charlie Needs Braces. Live looping sister duo, GuriNgai sisters Charlie and Miri perform their energetic musical landscapes of stories of their people, to keep culture and language alive.

Stretch & the Truth is a multi-instrumentalist, merging poetic storytelling with exceptional musicianship and folk, blues, and country inspired songs.

Trudy Fatnowna Edgeley is a multidisciplinary artist of Yidinji and South Sea Islander descent. Her music is grounded in a deep love of Country and a commitment to sharing cultural stories.

Neil Murray. Maverick award-winning song man, Neil Murray, is renowned for his songs about what it means to live in this country.

Ruby Lou Band. Ruby Lou sings you through the warmest, kindest corners of the universe. Backed by her incredible band, finding the funkier beats in the folkier songs.

Ganga Giri Band. Their unique blend of tribal-tech beats and ancient-modern fusion creates a powerful, unforgettable live show that ignites audiences and unites hearts through rhythm.

WORKSHOP LINE-UP

Create '**Extravagant Birds**' with Veronica Phillips and give farm waste new life by sculpting it into the form of one of the lake's threatened bird species.

How amazing is this! Trace Balla, renowned children's book author/illustrator, will tell you lots of interesting information about eels, show you some tips and tricks about **cartooning** and then you can make your own cartoon strip, all on the themes of the **amazing eels**.

Create your own **woven bush animal** with Gunditjmara artist and master weaver, Aunty Bronwyn Razem.

Join Bruce Watson, an experienced **ukulele** group leader who knows how to make it easy – and fun. Even beginners will be playing a tune in 5 minutes. Explore some ukulele techniques by singing and playing songs of Country, and even eels!

Make your own magical and unique botanical **head wear** with Amanda Perry-Bolt and help out Peter Day with some **weaving** on a large fish sculpture installation.

Come along and join in the fun with visual artist, Catherine van Wilgenburg, making **cards** and **temporary tattoos** of our endangered flora and fauna.

Join master craftsman Eli Beke of Wedge and Edge and learn the basics of **greenwood carving** to craft your very own butter spreader or story stick.

Have a yarn with The Connies and collect some awesome environmental **swap cards**.

Brett Clarke invites you to join him as he shares an **Indigenous perspective** on our **festival theme** 'Connecting Country and Culture'

Face-painting for the kids.

Cook your own **deadly damper** on a stick over a fire pit with Julie and Aleyna and enjoy with honey, jam or just butter.

Water fun with Stuart McCallum. You can create **rainbow water** by exploring how salt increases the density of water and food dye changes the colour. You can also investigate **water bugs** using optical and digital microscopes and make your own images of the microscopic life in the lake.

How can you engage your hearing to **connect more deeply to nature** around you? Acoustic ecologist, Andrew Skeoch, will show you! You'll hear the natural environment around you in a whole new way.

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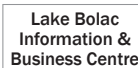

Speakers

- **David Allen** – Representative of Beyond Bolac, a local group working to improve biodiversity in the Fiery Creek, Lake Bolac and Salt Creek catchments. David will share his appreciation of the country and culture he has grown up and farmed in.
- **Andrew Skeoch** – Audio ecologist who brings his deep listening practice to the Festival. Andrew will share principles of listening to country and invite us to open our ears to the natural world.
- **Nicky Hudson** and **Jakobe Walker** will speak about the work of Gunditj Mirring traditional owners on eel programs in the Budj Bim World Heritage cultural landscape, including eel surveys, research, cultural education and care and restoration of waterways.
- **Marj Thorpe** will speak about the campaign to save the Djab Wurrung trees. Marj has been involved with the case to protect ancient, culturally sacred trees in southwestern Victoria, including 800-year-old birthing trees and directions trees deeply significant to the Djab Wurrung people for women's business, birthing, and songlines.
- **Meekah Merriman**, named the 2026 Warrnambool Young Citizen of the Year, is a proud young Indigenous woman, using art and storytelling to create belonging, share culture and advocate for young people.
